Bighorn-Desert View Water Agency is hosting the upcoming ABC's Of Water. This lecture is an update on local water supply projects utilizing the State Water Project thru the Morongo Basin Pipeline in order to maximize water supply reliability and to optimize the water demand/supply balance using artificial recharge. In a change from prior years, in 2008 the Agency employed a full-time General Manager and this allowed some efficiency measures to be implemented such as the elimination of one full-time Operations Manager position. In

needed for planned capital projects such as pump replacements but also for unplanned "emergencies". The Agency reserve balance is approximately \$780,000 an increase of approximately \$400,000 since 2008.

Board meetings are generally held on the 4th Tuesday of the month. There are several active Committees of the Board as well. In addition, a Field Supervisor position has been kept vacant since July 2010. Today the overall payroll is lower than it was under the 2008 staffing arrangements when the Agency employed a part-time General Manager.

There have been many notable accomplishments during these past 3 years but one significant item is our progress on the Ames/Reche Groundwater Storage and Recovery Project. The Board supports this project because it completes a decade's old promise to bring the Morongo Basin Pipeline into existence and to utilize it as a supplemental source of supply to their customers. Furthermore, entities that percolate water through this facility will be transferring 5% of their stored water to the Agency. Nearly 100% of the funding for this project has come from grants provided by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Mojave Water Agency.

One other notable accomplishment is a continued balanced budget and increase in reserve funds. Reserve funds are
